Upcoming: Spring '26 Oyster Float & Slat Sale, and OYS-101: Basics of Oyster Gardening Seminar

Mark your calendar for Saturday, May 23rd, at the Deltaville Maritime Museum and Nature Park, 287 Jackson Creek Road, Deltaville. That's the date and

location for TOGA's annual spring oyster float sales event. From 9 am to 12 noon, you can purchase all the materials needed for an oyster garden. In addition, Master Oyster Gardeners (MOGs) will be on hand to help you, whether you're just starting out or have some questions about your oyster garden. In addition, Richard Siciliano, MOG, will lead a class of **OYS-101: Basic Oyster Gardening** from 9:00-10:30 a.m. Register online for this free class: www.oystergardener.org/oyster-gardening-101 Unsure of the best oyster gear to get for your O-garden? An OYS-101 class scheduled before the May 1st order deadline will help you decide.

Place your orders online by May 1st, for Taylor Floats, Flip Floats, Tidal Tumblers, Rough Riders, and Bottom Cages, along with spat tubes, wire benders, and spat bags. Go to TOGA's website for a description of each device: www.oystergardener.org/devices-and-designs. Also available at the sale are small and medium spat bags, crab pot line, float wire mesh, shell bag material, TOGA-logo hats and T-shirts, with no pre-ordering needed.

Purchasing a TOGA float requires current membership. Order up to three wire floats, plus two spat tubes, including build-your-own purchases. Unsure about your membership status? Check the address label on the back of this mailed newsletter. Or contact Vic Spain: vicspain@rocketmail.com



Payment is due when you pick up pre-ordered floats, by noon. If you cannot be at the sales event, ask us to hold your float and let us know when and where you can pick up your purchase. Otherwise, unclaimed and unreserved floats will be sold to walkup customers.

During the Spring '26 Float Sale, vendors will sell triploid and diploid spat (as available.) Since demand for floats has been high, vendors will sell their own floats and equipment, along with spat. TOGA members and others who missed the order deadline can shop for different style floats, tools, and supplies not sold by TOGA.

The Annual Float Sale is one of TOGA's primary fundraising activities as a 501(c)(3) charitable organization. All proceeds beyond material costs go to the [TOGA/Virginia Institute of Marine Science \(VIMS\) Student Fellowship Endowment](#), and to other projects that foster oyster gardening and the health of the Bay.

Eagle Scout Candidate Marius Franklin and His Scouting Project

Late last summer, July 2025, I received an email from Martin Franklin, a TOGA member whose son, Marius, was working towards becoming an Eagle Scout. A Junior in Langley (VA) High School, Marius was searching for a project in his pursuit of that award. The Tidewater Oyster Gardening Association had worked before with prospective Eagle Scouts (see *"Feature Project: The Eagle Scout Grow-Out kit, p. 11, the TOGA Newsletter, March 2025"*), in conjunction with its volunteer-run float-building program. Floats and cages built by volunteers from TOGA's membership comprise the invaluable workforce that produces most of the oyster gardening devices offered to its members at cost.



When I asked him why he wanted to focus on constructing oyster floats for his project, Marius explained: *"Another dude (i.e., "Scout") in my Troop did a project making oyster cubes for the Chesapeake Bay Foundation."* Later in August, Marius, his dad and mom, Heidi, came to Camp Kekoka to tour the TOGA workplace, and the plan started to take shape in earnest. TOGA would supply the materials, and our float builders would train Marius to build the Tidal Tumbler (our most popular oyster containment device) so that he could, in turn, train his fellow Scout volunteers to build the Tidal Tumblers, in Vienna, Virginia.

When the floats were built, Marius would deliver the finished floats to Camp Kekoka for TOGA's Spring '26 Float Sale, to be held at the Deltaville Maritime Museum, May 23, 2026. Marius' float-building project to help him attain Eagle Scout was thus given the green light to start.

I asked who helped him on his project, and Marius stated: *"I had a lot of help -- 35 friends from my troop signed on to help, along with a couple of dogs. I first had to get my plan approved. I asked four people to write reference letters, I wrote a report for the Boy Scout Council outlining my plan in detail, and then I met with officials from Scouting America who questioned me in detail. I also took the Basic Oyster Gardening class (OYS-101) last September in Kilmarnock to learn what oyster gardening was all about. That class helped me learn about the different oyster floats and cages that TOGA builds, as well as how oysters develop from spat to adult."*

The final build took place on December 13, 2025, in Vienna, Virginia, with Marius in charge of his fellow scouts and adult volunteers. The Tidal Tumblers (a total of 45 completed) were delivered on December to Camp Kekoka, Kilmarnock. A special thanks goes to TOGA members Jim Dall, Vic Spain, Bob Eadie, and David Singleterry, who helped Marius with his project plans. And of course, a very special thanks goes to Marius from his TOGA friends. When he gets word about earning his Eagle Scout Award, we'll let everyone know.



Volunteers Needed to Help Build Oyster Floats and Cages

To prepare for the 2026 **Spring Float Sale, TOGA needs volunteers** to meet on Thursdays from 9 am to 12 noon at Camp Kekoka to build floats starting April 1st - May 21, 2026.

We rely on volunteers to build floats, help others at the build your own (BYO) float build day, and setup and support the sale event on May 23rd. This affords our members opportunities for fellowship with other oyster gardeners. The camaraderie of this group of volunteers is exceptional, and we eagerly welcome new volunteers. Organizing and helping on these float-build days is satisfying and what I enjoy the most. Others enjoy the camaraderie and accomplishment they feel from seeing the end products we create. If you have not already volunteered for a float build, you may be surprised at the backgrounds and diversity of knowledge our volunteers and board members bring; there is a role for everyone. You will learn how to use the tools we have and the techniques our volunteers with engineering, design, and manufacturing efficiency backgrounds have taught us. At the sale, we need all the help we can get with event organization, sales, record keeping, and communications.

Being a Float Building Volunteer:

The work is not hard, but for those unfamiliar with our building activities, here's what we do.

- Cutting blanks (sheets) from rolls of vinyl-coated galvanized metal wire mesh with both manual and pneumatic wire cutters
- Forming the wire blanks using wire benders
- Attaching edges of the formed float/cage wire blanks together with hog rings using both manual and pneumatic hog ring pliers.
- Building floats out of PVC pipe using chop saws to cut the pipe, and PVC primer and glue to bond the pipe section to elbow fittings
- Attaching the floats to the cages with plastic cable ties

Being a Build-Your-Own Float Day Volunteer:

This activity is typically an extension of the skills and knowledge acquired from participating in the float building. We assist members build the floats they ordered. It is extremely satisfying and

rewarding helping someone build their own oyster float from start to finish.

Being a Spring Float Sale Volunteer:

Recap: Celebrating a Successful Fall '25 Float and Spat Sale at Camp Kekoka

TOGA's Fall '25 Float Sale was held on October 18, 2025, at the APYC/YMCA Camp Kekoka in Kilmarnock where we build our floats, thanks to the support of the Alexandria Police Youth Camp (APYC). Held in conjunction with the *Oyster 101 Basic Oyster Gardening* class led by Master Gardener Richard Siciliano, the event was a success by all accounts. TOGA delivered 174 oyster float devices, including 31 Taylor floats, 21 Flip floats, 9 Bottom cages, 39 Tidal Tumbler floats, 17 Rough Rider cages, and 56 spat float/minnow tubes, designed to fit inside a Tidal Tumbler or Rough Rider as spat grows larger.

Our "build your own" (BYO) float date of October 10, 2025, was also well attended, resulting in new and veteran TOGA members building 14 floats.

Special thanks to all float-building volunteers who assisted and to Bob Eadie who built all the spat tubes. Thanks also to local oyster seed vendor Darryl Krolicki -- www.oyster.gardening.com – who provided Diploid and "Triploid oyster seed.

TOGA's annual float sales continue to be one of our main fundraising activities with all proceeds benefiting TOGA as a 501(C)3 non-profit organization and our partners, including the VIMS Foundation for the TOGA Graduate Student Fellowship program.

By the end of its first year, [The TOGA Store](#) generated \$7,500 in sales, with all profits going back to TOGA to be used for its educational goals and other outreach goals.

TOGA benefits financially, but more importantly, hundreds of oyster enthusiasts are now wearing the TOGA logo. Our members often say they've been stopped by strangers and asked about the TOGA cap or shirt they're wearing. What a great way to help spread the word about TOGA, and a different kind of conversation starter.




Ware Academy's 8th grade class is growing oysters in the North River in Gloucester (VA) with the support of TOGA's educational outreach director, Vic Spain. Ware Academy's middle school science teacher, Natalie Fleet, cold called TOGA last summer seeking support and direction to initiate an oyster growing project. Ms. Fleet is using oyster growing to provide a hands-on learning experience supporting curriculum objectives related to water quality in the Chesapeake Bay. TOGA and Mr. Vic (as referred to by Ware students) have provided training, teaching materials, oyster spat, and oyster floats to make this classroom project possible.

Cages are sold at TOGA's Spring Float & Spat Sale on May 23, 2026, at the Deltaville Maritime Museum and Nature Park, in Deltaville, VA. NOTE: Prices for floats and cages have been *reduced* since the last float sale. In 2025, a generous \$5,000 grant from the River Counties Community Foundation in White Stone, Virginia propelled our research into new designs and materials to improve TOGA devices, materials, tools, and construction techniques used to build them. We made several improvements that reduced costs and will be passing savings along to our members through reduced prices.

(New) Tidal Tumbler

- Dimensions: 36-inches long wire tube, measuring 12 inches in diameter. The new 5-liter float is made of light-weight but durable molded high-density polyethylene (HDPE) plastic that is more leak resistant than the older PVC design
- Capacity: Up to 150 market-size oysters
- Hangs from pier, tumbling oysters naturally with the tide
- All-wire cage = lower maintenance, increased durability, reduced fouling
